## **Continued Strike Action**

As you may be aware from recent media coverage, the National Education Union (NEU) has declared further strike action as no agreement on the current dispute has been reached. This action will take place on:

- Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> April 2023
- Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2023

The strike action is happening because of a national dispute between the unions and the government over teachers' pay and school funding. It is not because of any specific issues at our academy. Please rest assured these are national decisions that have been taking place over recent months and will most likely affect over 23,000 schools across the country.

During the strike action days, the academy will remain open for Year 11 pupils and other identified vulnerable students who will be contacted individually. Some year 11 students also have a formal examination on this date and I would like to reassure parents that this will not be disrupted and our usual arrangements will be in place.

We know that open and honest relationships with our families are crucial for our students' success. As a number of you have asked about the strikes, I wanted to take this opportunity to explain a little bit more about the NEU's reasons for taking strike action.

- Strike action is not simply about pay. It is about the state of the school system as a whole and the lack of school funding which is impacting directly on children and staff.
- The government say that school funding is higher than ever. However, there are now more children in schools than ever before. As such, there is less funding to go around and fewer services than ever before.
- Support services (like special educational needs support, educational support, health support, social care etc) that used to be provided by local government have been cut. Currently, schools either pay for these services from existing budgets or manage it in school. This has had a huge impact on staff well-being across the country and partly explains why there is a significant teacher shortage and why thousands of teachers are leaving the profession.
- The cost of all of the pay increases for teaching and support staff has been funded directly out of school budgets. The required extra money has not been given to schools to cover these payments. Unions firmly believes that these pay increases should be covered by the government, rather than from the schools' own budgets and money that was allocated to provide your child or children with the equipment, facilities, books and resources that they deserve.

Therefore, as a direct result of these issues, many teachers in schools across the country will be choosing to strike. Not for their own pay particularly, but because they fear for the teaching profession in general and the impact sustained underfunding is having and on their pupils and your children.

As ever, we want to support our families in the best way possible and want to reassure our entire community that if you need any help, advice or support on the days of the strike, key staff will be in the academy to assist. Students in Years 7-10 who are not expected in school on this date will not have their attendance record affected as there is a special code for exceptional circumstances, such as these.

We are hopeful that continuing talks between the unions and government will help to resolve the dispute, but we are aware that other teaching unions, like colleagues in the NHS and other services are continuing to consult members regarding strike action.

We know the children have faced much disruption over recent years owing to the COVID pandemic and so a range of work will be set on SENECA and google classroom for students to complete independently.

Thank you for your support and understanding in this matter and if the situation changes I will write to you to let you know.
