### **INK TEMA Offer:**

At TEMA, we believe that the curriculum is the sum total of everything that we hope students learn throughout their time with us.

The curriculum goes beyond that which is learned within a classroom and should include the opportunity to access a wide range of activities including the arts, culture and sport. We aim to build students' cultural capital through systematic and planned exposure to enrichment activities. We use a definition of culture which celebrates and embraces the different backgrounds, heritage, language and traditions of all of our students.

We recognise that access to and participation in extra-curricular activities is an important part of building students' soft skills and consequently an important building block in the foundations of social mobility. We have taken on board the recommendations of the Social Mobility Commission in having a designated co-ordinator of extra-curricular and enrichment activities.

We aim to give students the confidence and oracy skills needed to navigate themselves in elite spaces later in life as well as the skills needed to lead and promote positive change in their own communities.

Student Leaders form an integral part of the Student Voice process and have the opportunity to meet regularly with the Academy Leadership Team and effect real change in the academy. We aim to make our Student Leadership team diverse and representative of our student body. Student Leadership is an important part of our vision and commitment to students. We have high aspirations for our students and believe that developing them as leaders plays a key role in community transformation and improving their life chances.

Each year group has its own Student Leadership Team and 10% of the student population will have some leadership responsibility. We expect Student Leaders to represent our TEMA values of Respect, Equality, Ambition, Care and Hard Work.

Our Principal Student Leaders are voted for by their peers and are given the opportunity and responsibility on leading on self-directed projects within the academy as well as being important ambassadors for TEMA in the community.

In addition to our Student Leadership team, we recognise and encourage leadership through our Extended Leadership Groups. These aim to give safe spaces for students to discuss issues of relevance to them and promote marginalised voices within the Academy. These groups include, Empowered Women, the Boys Battalion, TEMA Pride and TEMA Youths of Diversity.

### STUDENT VOICE

Victoria - Higher Openshaw Community School: This school feels like home. If you need any help, the teachers always take care of you.

Students should arrive to the academy no later than 8.15 each day. The close of day is at 15.30 on Monday and Tuesday and 14.35 on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

At TEMA, our school day is thoughtfully designed to provide a structured and enriching educational experience for our students. The day typically begins with a meet and greet in the home base, fostering a sense of community and setting a positive tone for the day ahead. Our timetable incorporates a balanced mix of core subjects and specialist subjects. We believe in the importance of regular breaks and provide designated recess and lunchtime periods for students to relax, socialise, and engage in extracurricular activities. We also prioritise the well-being of our students, with opportunities for pastoral care and support throughout the day. Overall, our school day is designed to create a nurturing and stimulating environment where students can thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

The academy day starts at 08:25 every weekday and we advise that students arrive to the academy no later than 08:15 each day. The academy finishes at 15:35 on Monday and Tuesday, and at 14:40 on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Breakfast club is open to all students and runs from 07:30-08:25 every morning.

A range of after school clubs run each day and more details about this will be communicated to students in September where they can choose the club most suited to their interests.

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# ATTENDANCE & Punctuality

#### Attendance

We are committed to the continuous raising of progress for all students. Regular and punctual attendance is critical if students are to benefit from the opportunities available to them and enjoy a successful and fulfilling school experience.

Research clearly demonstrates the link between regular attendance and educational progress and attainment. Students who frequently miss school often fall behind and they may find it challenging to make the expected progress in their learning. Regular absences may also lead to students finding it difficult in maintaining friendships and they can feel isolated from their school community.

### Punctuality

All students are expected to be at the academy by 08:15 and breakfast is available from 07:30 every day. Students who arrive after 08:30 will be late to registration and will be issued with an L mark in the register.

# THE TEMA WAY

Our teachers demonstrate their belief in the potential of our students by:

- holding high expectations of all students so that lessons challenge students to think, question and interrogate knowledge.
- delivering lessons where students acquire and retain core knowledge and skills.
- following the TEMA way practices so that the high expectations can be upheld, good learning can take place in all lessons, and students develop their character and positive behaviours, according to our REACH values.

There are a number of behaviours within the TEMA way that we promote and teach to all students so that they can become positive role models for each other now and active global citizens in the future.

#### Ready to Learn – students are expected to arrive

#### at the academy with:

- a. Correct uniform
- b. A fully stocked pencil case
- **c.** A TEMA planner
- **d.** Their TEMA reads book
- e. Knowledge organiser
- f. A school bag

Staff will check these during line-ups and during their lessons so that disruption caused by lack of equipment is minimised.

**Wonderful Walking** – students are expected to walk around the academy in a calm and quiet manner, walking on the left, as this will ensure safe corridors.

Hands up for Silence – for a member of staff to gain attention of the class, they will raise their hand. Students are expected to stop what they are doing and also raise their hand.

**Line Ups** – at TEMA, students' line up every day at the end of breaks and lunch times. This ensures that students end their social times and proceed to their next lesson in a calm, focused and safe manner.

### STAR – when the teacher is speaking and issuing instructions, students should:

- a. Sit up, arms folded.
- **b.** Track the speaker.
- c. Answer the questions in full sentences.
- d. REACH demonstrate REACH values.

Expect to be Asked – students should be prepared to answer a question at any point in a lesson. Teachers will give time for students to think hard about their answer,

'I don't know' will not be accepted.

#### Pause for Applause – at TEMA we

celebrate excellent work and student success, every lesson. This helps to promote confidence and pride in student work.



# DRESS FOR Success

School uniform plays a valuable role in contributing to the ethos of a school and setting an appropriate tone. In the past we have spent considerable time working with our students to agree a uniform that they felt proud to wear.

#### Our uniform includes:

- House lanyard and TEMA tie. These are provided by school in September.
- All black footwear. No coloured stripes or soles.
- Black trousers or a black pleated skirt of school uniform style. Leggings, jeans-type leggings and jogging-type trousers are not permitted. Skirts must be of an appropriate length (maximum 2" above the knee).
- Plain white shirt or blouse with top button fastened.
- Academy blazer displaying the academy logo.
   There is a school jumper but this is an optional item.



- A **school bag** which is large enough to bring a PE kit and fit A4 sized books.
- Coats and scarves off before the door. No coats and scarves inside.
- Subtle makeup is permitted. False eyelashes and nails should be of a natural length and appearance.
- Students' hair does not form part or our uniform expectations. We expect that long hair should be tied back when working in a science laboratory or technology classroom for health and safety purposes.
- Students must not wear jewellery.
- Wristwatches are permitted except smart watches.

Every student at The East Manchester Academy is placed into a progress group with a dedicated progress tutor. Each tutor will be pivotal to the success of students - monitoring, guiding and supporting them in both academic and pastoral areas.

#### They will:

- Monitor homework and equipment.
- Conduct short reading lessons every day.

- Be your first point of contact if you have any questions, worries or concerns.


#### **Progress groups**


